What is the Gas Safe Register?

The Gas Safe Register is the only official list of gas engineers who are registered to work safely and legally on gas in the UK, Isle of Man, Guernsey, and Jersey.

Who should be on the Register?
By law, anyone who comes to fit, fix or service your gas appliances, pipework and flues must be on the Gas Safe Register. Knowing your engineer is Gas Safe registered brings peace of mind that you're in safe hands.

Find or check a Gas Safe registered engineer
There's a list of all Gas Safe registered engineers on our website: GasSafeRegister.co.uk or call **0800 408 5500** and one of our advisors will help you find a registered engineer in your area. You can also check that an engineer is registered by asking to see their Gas Safe Register ID card, which will display their name, business name and details of their qualifications.

Who are Gas Safe Register?
As well as being the list of qualified gas engineers, Gas Safe Register is also the name of the registration body that issues a licence to engineers enabling them to legally work on gas. Gas engineers are not employed by Gas Safe Register, we are here to make sure engineers are working safely. If you have a gas safety concern or suspect someone is carrying out gas work without registration, then we can investigate.

In a gas emergency

Do you smell gas or suspect carbon monoxide in your home?
In a gas emergency you'll need to act quickly — turn off the gas at the meter, put out naked flames, open windows, and immediately call the gas emergency number for your area. If you feel unwell seek medical help.

Keep your home gas safe

Badly fitted and poorly serviced gas appliances can put you and your family at risk of gas leaks, fires, explosions and carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning. Follow these simple tips to stay gas safe:

- Have your gas appliances checked every year by a Gas Safe registered engineer.**
- Check for warning signs that your appliance might not be working correctly.** If you spot any of the following, it's time to call a Gas Safe registered engineer:
 - dark, sooty staining on or around your gas appliance
 - floppy yellow flames instead of crisp blue ones (except for fuel-effect fires that display this colour flame)
 - increased condensation inside windows
 - the boiler pilot light keeps going out.
- Don't DIY or use an illegal gas worker.** If they're not on the Gas Safe Register, they're working illegally. Don't take the risk to save a few pennies. It could end up costing you more to put things right, and put your family's lives at risk.
- Comply with Building Regulations.** If you live in England or Wales, make sure your Gas Safe registered engineer notifies the installation of any heat-producing gas appliance to your local authority. You'll want to keep your Building Regulations Compliance Certificate safe, as it may be needed when you move house.

Carbon monoxide

Carbon monoxide (CO) is released when gas appliances do not have enough oxygen to burn correctly. You cannot see, smell, or taste it and it is highly poisonous. CO can kill quickly without warning or cause serious long-term health problems.

The symptoms of CO poisoning are often mistaken for the flu, food poisoning or fatigue. However, there can be other signs that indicate CO poisoning. For example, if your symptoms occur when you are at home and get better when you leave the house, or if others in your home (including pets) experience similar symptoms at the same time. Regular servicing can help ensure your appliances burn correctly, but to be extra safe we recommend that you install a suitable audible CO alarm marked with EN50291, the British Standards Kitemark, or another European approval organisation's mark. If you think you are suffering from CO poisoning, get fresh air immediately and seek medical help.

Know the signs of carbon monoxide poisoning:

- Headaches
- Dizziness
- Breathlessness
- Nausea
- Collapse
- Loss of consciousness

Do you rent your home?

Landlords are legally responsible for their tenants' gas safety and the gas appliances they provide.

Under the Gas Safety (Installation and Use) Regulations 1998 your landlord must:

- arrange for a Gas Safe registered engineer to carry out a gas safety check every year
- provide you with a copy of the landlord gas safety record before you move in and within 28 days of the annual check taking place
- maintain the gas appliances, pipework and flues they provide in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.

As a tenant, you should cooperate with your landlord to make sure you allow the engineer access to the property when a safety check or service is due. When they arrive, ask to see their Gas Safe Register ID card. Remember to also arrange for any gas appliances that you own to be checked by a qualified Gas Safe registered engineer. If your landlord refuses to carry out their legal gas responsibilities, contact the Health & Safety Executive at: hse.gov.uk/gas/domestic 0800 300 363

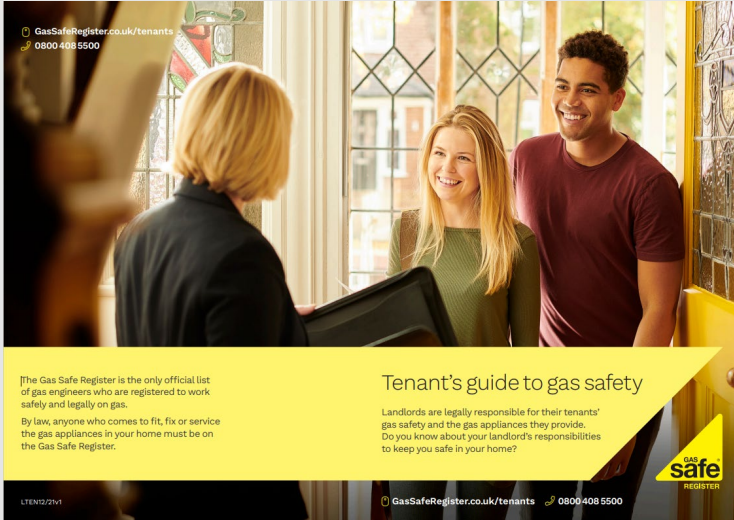

Gas safety in your home

You may only think about your gas appliances when something goes wrong, but having a badly fitted or poorly serviced gas appliance can put you and your family at risk.

Gas Safe Register is the only official list of gas engineers who are registered to work safely and legally on gas appliances. By law, all gas engineers must be on the Register.

Only use a Gas Safe registered engineer to fit, fix or service your gas appliances.

Remember to also check the Gas Safe Register ID card to make sure the engineer is qualified for the work you need doing.

Keep your home gas safe

Follow these simple tips to stay safe:

- Have your gas appliances checked every year by a Gas Safe registered engineer.
- Check for warning signs on or around gas appliances (like soot or staining, increased condensation, floppy yellow flames, the boiler pilot light keeps going out).
- Don't DIY or use an illegal gas worker. If they're not on the Gas Safe Register, they're working illegally and could be putting you at risk.
- Carbon monoxide (CO) is a highly poisonous gas that you cannot see, smell or taste. Fit an audible CO alarm marked EN50291 to alert you if it's present.
- Know the signs of CO poisoning. Seek help immediately if you're experiencing headaches, dizziness, nausea, breathlessness, collapse and loss of consciousness.

BBQ safety



BBQs produce carbon monoxide (CO), which is a highly poisonous gas. Without enough fresh air CO can kill quickly with no warning.

Follow these simple tips for BBQ safety:

- Never take a smouldering or lit BBQ (charcoal or gas) into a tent, caravan or cabin. Even if you have finished cooking your BBQ will still give off fumes for some hours after use.
- Never use a BBQ inside to keep you warm.
- Never leave a lit BBQ unattended or while sleeping.
- Only use BBQs in accordance with the operating instructions.
- Place your cooking area well away from your tent. Always ensure there is enough fresh air where the BBQ is being used.
- Remember the six main symptoms of CO poisoning – headaches, dizziness, breathlessness, nausea, collapse and loss of consciousness. If concerned, seek medical help immediately.


Follow these extra tips if you are using gas camping equipment:



- Check that the appliance is in good order and that hoses are properly attached and undamaged. If in doubt get the hoses replaced or don't use it.
- Make sure the gas tap or cylinder valve is turned off before changing the gas cylinder. Only change the cylinder in the open air.
- Don't over-tighten joints.
- Never take a gas stove, light or heater into a tent, caravan, or cabin unless it is a permanent fixture, which is installed and maintained correctly by a Gas Safe registered engineer.
- When you have finished cooking, turn off the gas cylinder before you turn off the BBQ controls – this means any gas in the hose and pipework will be used up.
- Read the manufacturer's instructions about how to check for gas escapes from hoses or pipework, e.g. brushing leak detection solution around all joints and looking for bubbles.

Gas Safe Register is the official list of gas engineers who are legally allowed to work on gas appliances.

By law, anyone who comes to fit, fix or service the gas appliances in your home must be on the Gas Safe Register. Landlords are legally responsible for their tenants' gas safety and the gas appliances. They provide. Do you know about your landlord's responsibilities to keep you safe in your home?

Your gas safety

Follow these simple tips to help keep you safe:

- Cooperate with your landlord and make sure you allow the Gas Safe registered engineer access to the property, so they can carry out the safety check.
- Have any gas appliances that you own checked every year by a Gas Safe registered engineer.
- Check for warning signs that your appliance might not be working correctly:
 - dark, sooty staining on or around your gas appliance
 - foggily yellow flames instead of crisp blue ones (except for hot-effect fires that display this colour flame)
 - increased condensation inside windows
 - the boiler pilot light keeps going out.
- If you think your appliance is faulty, turn it off and let your landlord know.

Unsafe gas appliances can put you at risk of gas leaks, fires, explosions and carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning. You cannot see, smell or taste CO. Know the signs of CO poisoning:

- headaches
- dizziness
- nausea
- breathlessness
- collapse
- loss of consciousness.

If you experience these symptoms, or suspect a gas leak, get from an immediately, seek medical help, and call the gas emergency number: ☎ 0800 111 999
